	 Trauma informed
	• A group of interdisciplinary health, education, and human by providing
	access to evidence-based buffering resources and supports that help to
	prevent, treat, and heal the harmful consequences of toxic stress
	• CHW: often share many of the same characteristics with the populations
	they serve.
	• Successes: enabled tri-counties CAP to hire 3 staff, enhanced capacity of regions
